Deer Hunters

2012 Special Antlerless Deer Seasons

Dates to Remember

Early Antlerless Deer Season September 22 - 23, 2012

Late Antlerless Deer Season December 17, 2012 - January 1, 2013

Youth & 100% Disabled Veteran firearm deer hunt...

will take place on all lands (including Lost Lake Woods Club) in Michigan *September 22-23, 2012*. Youth 16 years of age or younger may participate in this special hunt. Hunters under the age of 10 must be licensed through the Mentored Youth Hunting Program and accompanied by a qualified mentor. For youth 10-16 years of age and qualified veterans with disabilities, valid licenses include a combination, firearm or antlerless deer license. During this two-day hunt only, a firearm or combination license may be used for an antlered or antlerless deer. A Deer Management Assistance (DMA) permit may also be used to take one antlerless deer only, if issued for the area/land upon which hunting. Archery and junior archery deer licenses are not valid for this hunt. The bag limit for this season is one deer.

A veteran who has been determined to have a 100 percent disability or is rated as individually unemployable by the U.S. Department of Veteran Affairs may participate in this hunt. Documentation from the Veterans Administration shall be in the possession of a veteran participating in this hunt.

All hunters are required to wear hunter orange and must have permission from the landowner or leaseholder before hunting on private land. The telephone number of the private landowner is required to acquire a private-land antlerless deer license.

Club rules requiring antlered deer to have at least 3-Points on one side still apply!


At the Club, please note:

*Deer (archery and rifle) blind tags are required and may be obtained at the Lodge, *in person*, with presentation of appropriate, valid hunting license.

*Any tagged permanent ground deer blind not re-tagged by October 15th is considered abandoned and may be tagged by another member or may be subject to demolition and removal as directed by the club manager.

*No new permanent ground blinds may be constructed between November 1 and December 1.

*No rifle blind tags shall be issued after October 15th.

1. Legacy Membership - May/Promotions

Jim May made the following motion: The BOD direct the Promotions Committee to investigate the proposed Family Legacy Plan, review the current By-Laws to determine what By-Laws are affected, and to make suggested By-Law changes and wording that will eventually be put forth to the membership for a vote and approval. Bob Ruess seconded. Handouts describing the proposal were presented to the board. All in favor, motion passed.

2. Lodge Study - May

Jim May made a motion to create a Lodge Renewal Committee that will be comprised of 6-8 members. The committee members must apply to the BOD for a position on the committee and must demonstrate a professional skill that is beneficial to the completion of the committee's goal.

The goal of the committee will be to learn from the club membership, club management, and staff, through interviews, surveys, etc., the needs and wants towards a new or renewed LLWC lodge.

This committee will be tasked with taking all of this information and creating several professional proposals to be presented to the BOD and eventually to the club membership for action.

- Maintenance reported the water pump in the lodge failed the day after Memorial Day. Repairs were made the same week and we were back up and running by the next weekend. However, LLWC should look into having a back up well specifically for the lodge and he will have some numbers for budget requests. Repairs are estimated to be in the \$5000 to \$6000 range

- We also had issues with the lodge septic line between the lodge and the maintenance building. A Contractor was called into repair the leak and while they were here, we had them camera the line and clean it out all the way from the lodge to the maintenance building. Repairs should be about \$1000 and it was suggested that we do this every other year. It had not been done in approx. 30 years so in reality we should probably have it done every five years at a minimum.
- Jim Dennis's computer died just before the Men's Invitational, but our IT person was able to put a new computer in before the Invitational started
- Spaghetti Dinner, Men's Invitational, and Memorial Day Weekend events all went well.
- Junior Golf Camp, 4th of July activities, Skills Camp, and Rummage Sale are coming up quickly.
- Dining Room has not been very busy during the week for breakfast and lunch. Ron suggested that more wide spread advertising that we are open this year during these times may help.
- 4th of July activities are on Saturday, July 7th and Ron has put on as
 much security as possible for that weekend. However, please understand
 our security cannot be everywhere and the crowds may still be more than
 our security can handle.
- Our recently hired Food & Beverage manager was let go and we will be continuing to look for a new candidate.
- Swimmer's itch was been reported and the beach. The lake has been treated once and will be treated again closer to the 4th of July. In the meantime, please be sure to rinse off when you come out of the water.
- It was suggested that we upgrade the TV in the manager's apartment.
 Jim Mead motioned to spend up to \$750 to buy a new TV for the apartment.
 Joel Blohm seconded.
 All in favor, motion passed.

C. President's Report - Jim Mead

- Jim Mead would like to form an ad hoc committee to help clean up the subdivision. With the board's approval he would like the committee to help the manger enforce the subdivision rules & regulations, especially dealing with member complaints. The board agreed.
- With the proliferation of election time, Jim Mead wanted to remind the


Our wildlife management program dictates that we create approximately 200 acres of openings and food plots. Openings are just as vital as food sources in that they created bedding and fawning areas, and also nesting areas for upland birds. The conservation Committee is doing a trial starting this year to convert some openings into a combination of native grasses and perennial forage.

In order to be successful in our efforts, we ask all of you, members and guests to please stay off of cultivated and planted areas. If you must go through one of these areas, please use the extreme edges and try to do as little damage as possible. We have had a serious problem this year with field damage. It is so serious that the Board of Directors has offered a reward for the identity of the persons responsible for the damage.

Hunting season is just around the corner. Let's be safe and have a great time hunting at our club. Below is a list of season dates.






